In this week's Gospel, Jesus talks about what it means to be prepared to receive the Kingdom of Heaven. This week's reading follows a series of warnings and predictions by Jesus about the coming of the Son of Man. Jesus wants his disciples to understand that the exact day and time cannot be predicted. He teaches the disciples that they must remain vigilant so that they will not be caught unprepared.

When thinking about the parable of the wise and foolish virgins, it is important to consider the first-century wedding traditions of Palestine. Scholars tell us that it was the custom of the day for young maidens—friends and family members of the bride—to meet the bridegroom when he came to bring his bride to her new home.

As with many of Jesus' parables, several levels of interpretation are possible. In last week's Gospel, we heard Jesus warn against following the example of the Pharisees and scribes. If read in the context of early Christianity's struggle to define itself against Pharisaic Judaism, this parable is a continuing critique of Judaism. It suggests that the Jewish leaders were like the foolish virgins, unprepared to meet Jesus, the bridegroom of Israel.

In the chapter preceding this parable, however, Jesus warns about the destruction of Jerusalem, the tribulation of the end times, and the coming of the Son of Man. When read in this context, today's parable is a warning to the Christian community to remain vigilant and prepared to receive Jesus, the Son of Man who will return at the end of time. This interpretation is supported by the reference to the delay of the bridegroom. The Christian community for whom Matthew wrote this Gospel was coming to terms with the realization that the promise of Jesus' return would not be fulfilled within their lifetimes. The question remains for us to ask ourselves, are we ready to receive Jesus? Will we be prepared to receive him? (loyolapress.com)

THIS IS THE PARISH HOME FOR ALL OF US – SO WELCOME HOME!

During the period of gradual re-opening,

we continue to act with the greatest of care and caution in order to protect the health, safety and life of every community member.

Public health guidelines and respect for our fellow parishioners require us to:

- Masks or face coverings are required in all indoor public spaces in Toronto, including our Church; WEAR MASKS FOR THE DURATION OF MASS (unless a medical condition prevents you from doing so); removing them only to consume host after receiving Communion
- Sanitize our hands upon entering the building
- Provide contact information to the volunteers at the entrance, for contact tracing purposes, should there be an occurrence of Covid 19
- Maintain a physical distance of 2 metres while inside the building; pews have been marked with green tape to denote safe seating
- Follow directional markings in the church to maintain proper distancing
- Refrain from congregational singing, as there is evidence that singing can result wide spread of droplets, thus increasing the risk of spreading the virus.
- Stay home if you are experiencing symptoms such as a fever or cough.

Understandably, for some members of our community, a return to Mass at this time is not advisable due to poor general health or immune system issues. Please note that Cardinal Collins continues to provide dispensation from the Sunday Mass for those unable to attend for health reasons or due to capacity restrictions. The archdiocese will continue to livestream Sunday Masses, and you may wish to join in prayer with the parish community via our YouTube channel, as we will continue to provide recordings during this gradual re-opening period.

Weekdays – parishioners are invited to participate in daily weekday Masses at 7PM (maximum capacity – 25)

Sundays – parishioners are invited to participate in Sunday Masses

We will accept registrations before entering the church.

Please - be patient.

9AM in English (maximum capacity – 90)

Doors will be open at 8:30 AM and close between 10 AM - 10:30 AM. The church has to be sanitized between Masses For 11AM Lithuanian Mass (maximum capacity – 90) the Church will be opened at 10:30AM

P.S. *we are beginning to distribute paper copies of the parish bulletin. In order to limit the potential for spreading the virus, and in accordance with archdiocesan guidelines, the bulletin will be handed out as you exit the church.

*As we return to a "new normal", we expect more parishioners may return to Sunday Mass. Maximum capacity remains at 90 persons per Mass, in order to comply with social distancing guidelines. Should this capacity be exceeded, additional seating will be made available in the church hall, with audio broadcast of the Mass. We ask for your patience and understanding in these unusual times.

Pope at Audience: Prayer is rudder to guide course of our lives

At the weekly General Audience, Pope Francis says Jesus shows us that we must pray early, often, and in silence, and urges everyone to pray for those who are ill with Covid-19 and the medical personnel working



to treat them. Pope Francis began his Wednesday General Audience noting that the event must "unfortunately" be held once again in the library of the Apostolic Palace without the presence of the faithful. He called it a reminder of the importance of respecting the directives laid out by political and health authorities. He also invited everyone to pray for those who are ill with Covid-19 and for the medical personnel working hard to treat them.

"Let us offer the Lord this distance between us, for the good of all," he said. "And let us think often about the ill, those who are already considered left behind. Let us think about doctors, nurses, volunteers, and the many people who are working with the sick right now, who risk their lives but do it out of love, their vocation, and love for their neighbor. Let us pray for them."

Mysterious reality - The Pope then continued his catechesis on Jesus' example of prayer. "Jesus' prayer is a mysterious reality, of which we intuit only something, but which allows us to interpret His entire mission from the right perspective." Jesus, added the Pope, immersed Himself often in intimacy with God the Father, "in the Love that every soul thirsts for."

Rudder that guides His course - Pope Francis focused his reflections on a passage in the Gospel of Mark (1:32,34-38), in which Jesus heals many sick people late one evening before rising early to pray in a deserted place alone. After the disciples find Jesus to say the whole village of Capernaum is looking for Him, Jesus declares that He must preach to the other towns as well.

"Prayer is the rudder that guides Jesus' course." This, said the Pope, means that Jesus lets God guide His path, and not the desires and adulation of others. He went on to draw four lessons from Jesus' witness of prayer. Jesus, said Pope Francis, teaches us above all that prayer should be "the first desire of the day." "A day lived without prayer risks transforming into a bothersome or tedious experience: all that happens to us could turn into a badly endured and blind fate."

However, Jesus demonstrates the need to be obedient and to listen, since prayer is first of all "an encounter with God."

"The problems of everyday life, then, do not become obstacles, but appeals from God Himself to listen to and encounter those who are in front of us."

Persistence - Secondly, said the Pope, Jesus teaches us that prayer is an art that must be practiced "with insistence." Though anyone can pray sporadically, Jesus reminds us that prayer requires discipline, practice, and constant effort. "Consistent prayer produces a progressive transformation, makes us strong in times of tribulation, gives us the grace to be supported by Him who loves us and always protects us."

Solitary and silent - Thirdly, Jesus' prayer is always solitary. "Those who pray do not escape from the world, but prefer deserted places."

In the silence of prayer, said Pope Francis, our innermost desires and truths emerge into the light.

But most importantly, he added, silence is where God speaks. "Every person needs a space for him- or herself, to be able to cultivate the inner life, where actions find meaning." To and fro in God

Finally, Pope Francis said, prayer as taught by Jesus is the place where we find that "everything comes from God and returns to Him."

He noted that prayer helps us to rediscover "the right dimension in our relationship with God, our Father, and with all creation."

Peace and joy, concluded the Pope, is what we will find if we follow Jesus' example of prayer.

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
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
