# **28th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME-A**



Immediately after criticizing the religious leaders through the parable of the tenants in last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus proceeded to tell another parable, again directed at the religious leaders. We hear this parable in today's Gospel.

In the parable of the wedding feast, Jesus offers an image of the kingdom of heaven using the symbol of a wedding banquet. In today's first reading from the prophet Isaiah and in today's psalm, the Lord's goodness is evident in the symbol of a feast of good food and wine. Jesus' listeners would have been familiar with the image of a wedding feast as a symbol for God's salvation. They would consider themselves to be the invited guests. Keeping this in mind helps us to understand the critique Jesus makes with this parable. The context for this parable is the

growing tension between Jesus and the Jewish religious leaders in Jerusalem.

The parable Jesus tells is straightforward. The king dispatches his servants to invite the guests to the wedding feast that he is planning for his son. The listeners would have been surprised to learn that the first guests refused the invitation. Who would refuse the king's invitation? A second dispatch of servants follows. Again, to the listeners' great surprise, some guests ignore the invitation. Some of the invited guests even go so far as to mistreat and kill the servants. The king invokes his retribution against these murderers by destroying them and burning their city.

With the invited guests now deemed unworthy to attend the king's wedding feast, the servants are sent to invite whomever they can find. The guests arrive, but it appears that accepting the king's invitation brings certain obligations. The guest who failed to dress in the appropriate wedding attire is cast out of the feast. We are reminded that while many are invited to the kingdom of heaven, not all are able to meet its requirements. God invites us to his feast, giving us his salvation. Yet he asks us to repent for our sins.

Jesus' message in the parable cautions against exclusive beliefs about the kingdom of heaven. The parable also teaches about humility. Those who assume that they are the invited guests may find that they have refused the invitation, and so others are invited in their place. To accept the invitation is also to accept its obligations. God wants our full conversion in complete acceptance of his mercy. (loyolapress.com) R.R.

## THIS IS THE PARISH HOME FOR ALL OF US – SO WELCOME HOME!

During the period of gradual re-opening,

we continue to act with the greatest of care and caution in order to protect the health, safety and life of every community member.

Public health guidelines and respect for our fellow parishioners require us to:

- Masks or face coverings are required in all indoor public spaces in Toronto, including our Church; WEAR MASKS FOR THE DURATION OF MASS (unless a medical condition prevents you from doing so); removing them only to consume host after receiving Communion

- Sanitize our hands upon entering the building
- Provide contact information to the volunteers at the entrance, for contact tracing purposes, should there be an occurrence of Covid 19
- Maintain a physical distance of 2 metres while inside the building; pews have been marked with green tape to denote safe seating
- Follow directional markings in the church to maintain proper distancing
- Refrain from congregational singing, as there is evidence that singing can result wide spread of droplets, thus increasing the risk of spreading the virus.
- Stay home if you are experiencing symptoms such as a fever or cough.

Understandably, for some members of our community, a return to Mass at this time is not advisable due to poor general health or immune system issues. Please note that Cardinal Collins continues to provide dispensation from the Sunday Mass for those unable to attend for health reasons or due to capacity restrictions. The archdiocese will continue to livestream Sunday Masses, and you may wish to join in prayer with the parish community via our YouTube channel, as we will continue to provide recordings during this gradual re-opening period.

Weekdays – parishioners are invited to participate in daily weekday Masses at 7PM (maximum capacity – 25)

**Sundays** – parishioners are invited to participate in Sunday Masses

We will accept registrations before entering the church.

Please - be patient.

**9AM** in English (maximum capacity – 90)

Doors will be open at 8:30 AM and close between 10 AM - 10:30 AM. The church has to be sanitized between Masses For 11AM Lithuanian Mass (maximum capacity – 90) the Church will be opened at 10:30AM

P.S. \*we are beginning to distribute paper copies of the parish bulletin. In order to limit the potential for spreading the virus, and in accordance with archdiocesan guidelines, the bulletin will be handed out as you exit the church.

\*As we return to a "new normal", we expect more parishioners may return to Sunday Mass. Maximum capacity remains at 90 persons per Mass, in order to comply with social distancing guidelines. Should this capacity be exceeded, additional seating will be made available in the church hall, with audio broadcast of the Mass. We ask for your patience and understanding in these unusual times.

On the eve of the Feast of St. Francis, Fr. Julius Sasnauskas, OFM, was named an Honorary citizen of the city of Vilnius. He is only the 17th person to be bestowed with this special title.



Born in Vilnius, and exiled for many years for his anti-soviet activism, he

studied at the Kaunas seminary, and was ordained to the priesthood, not in Lithuania, but in Canada.

"...in the autumn of 1994, amid tense relations with the leadership of the seminary, I left Vilnius for Toronto, as if heading to a new place of exile. It was a painful separation from my work at "Mazoji Studija" and the newly opened Bernadine church.

Everything turned out for the best. In Toronto, not only 1 receive the sacrament of Holy Orders from Bishop Paul Baltakis, OFM, but many other things as well. My first parish was there - cherished as a first love. Humble Franciscan friars dedicated to the Church and community of friendly, sincere and generous people – particularly, the Catholic Women's' League. So many wonderful stories and friendships opened up through those acquaintances. A new vision of priesthood was formed there. There also, I began writing short texts for "Siaures Atenai", that later became my first book. Retreats, camps and charitable events where else could one have gained such experience? The famous Bernadine Church post-Mass breakfasts that have become a decades-long tradition also sprang from my Toronto years, from encounters with parishioners who knew well how beautifully two tables complement one another – those of the Mass and of our daily bread.

After almost three years, I had to bid farewell to Toronto. Again, through tears. It had become home. I am prone to attachment. However, priests are like soldiers. One goes where one is sent.

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
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
