CHRISTMAS - A



The Gospel for the Christmas Mass during the day is taken from the beginning of John's Gospel, but this Gospel is not an Infancy Narrative like those found in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Instead, John's Gospel begins at the beginning, as it were, and presents the Creation story as the framework for announcing the Incarnation. John's opening words, "In the beginning . . .," echo the opening verse of the Book of Genesis. This framework invites us to view Jesus' birth from God's perspective. Each of the Gospels makes clear that Jesus' birth was the result of God's initiative. However, John's Gospel highlights that this was the divine intention from the very beginning, from the moment of Creation.

In this prologue to the Gospel of John, the main themes that will be developed in his Gospel are introduced. These themes are presented as dualities: light/darkness, truth/falsehood, life/death, and belief/unbelief. We also hear in this prologue a unique aspect of John's Gospel—the motif of testimony. John the Baptist was sent by God to testify about Jesus, the light. Others in this Gospel will also offer testimony about Jesus. The reader is invited to accept this testimony, which bears witnesses to Jesus, the Son of God. But even more directly, Jesus' action and words will themselves testify to his identity with God as God's Incarnate Word.

Thinking about Jesus' birth in these theological and cosmological terms seems particularly appropriate as we celebrate the feast of Christmas in the darkness of winter. At this time, nature itself seems to remind us of the darkness of sin. Into this darkness, in the midst of our sinfulness, God comes to dwell among us. John's Gospel reminds us that through the Incarnation, God saves us from the darkness of sin and makes us his children. (loyolapress.com)

<...>Serenity is given to us by confiding in God's help - The Pope remarked that this serenity is given to us by our faith in God and by entrusting ourselves to His help, as Mary and Joseph did when giving birth to Jesus in Bethlehem.



"I wish you this: that each one of you has faith in God and that in families there is the simplicity of entrusting themselves to His help, to pray to Him and to thank Him."

The Pope wished peace of mind, especially for children and young people who have been particularly affected by the closures and limitations imposed by the COVID-19 crisis.

Be witnesses and artisans of peace - A second wish Pope Francis expressed was that we all may be "witnesses and artisans of peace". "At this moment in the history of the world, we are called to feel more strongly the responsibility of each one doing his or her part to build peace," he said, noting that this responsibility is particularly relevant for those who work for the Holy See.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

With this letter I share my Christmas greeting with you.

In the words of this Gospel message, we learn how the Holy Family once had to avoid persecution by fleeing to Egypt and then returned home. This passage speaks of a physical return to one's home. However, no matter where we live in this world, we are always able to return to our roots, to cherish our identity and our cultural heritage.

During his visit to Lithuania, Pope Francis invited everyone to remember the history of their nation and their individual families; to show interest in the stories of their parents and grandparents, to gain some of their wisdom. Christmas presents a perfect opportunity to sit around a common table and converse about Lithuania, about faith and to remember the old Christmas traditions. It is most important to share an encouraging message with young people and young families, that, although they may live elsewhere, they should not forget their Lithuanian identity.

For our Lithuanian identity to stay vibrant, we must thank all the Lithuanian communities around the world that work towards that goal: a sincere thank you to the families and members of Lithuanian parishes and missions, to the Saturday school teachers who volunteer their time to help strengthen the Lithuanian roots and keep alive the spoken language of their students. I thank the many priests and religious brothers and sisters who share the truths of the Catholic Church, evangelizing the younger generations. These most important pillars of our Lithuanian identity help us to form Lithuanian "islands" where we live and where we can feel at home.

During the Christmas season, let us wish one another peace. Gathered around the Christmas table, let us be united in the spirit of forgiveness and hope.
