God established the family in the marriage of Adam and Eve. The first reading teaches us the importance God places on the family. Loving and honoring our parents, especially when they are old, yields a long life, blessings, and forgiveness of our sins.

As God's chosen and beloved ones, we too, must reflect on this awesome love in our lives. Paul almost runs out of words – compassion, kindness, humility, and gentleness – to stress the love we should have for one another. It was God who chose our parents, siblings and children for us. Our family, created by God, must reflect His love.

Today we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. As we do so, our Gospel invites us to consider Joseph's protection of Jesus in the face of danger. Just as in the announcement of Jesus' birth, an angel appears to Joseph in a dream. The angel warns him of Herod's plans to harm Jesus. Joseph follows the command of the angel and takes Joseph and Mary to Egypt, returning only after receiving word in another dream that it was safe to do so.

This feast is part of the Christmas season, so we should look at today's Gospel in the context of what Scripture tells us about Jesus' birth. Today's reading is found in the Gospel of Matthew, following the story of the visit of the Magi. Recall that Matthew's story about the birth of Jesus makes Joseph the primary character. Among Matthew's themes in this infancy narrative is Jesus as the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies about the messiah. Indeed, the story of the Holy Family's flight to Egypt recalls the story of Moses in the Book of Exodus.

The Holy Family's escape to Egypt reminds us of the struggles and sacrifices that are required as preparation for God's salvation. †R.R.



#### Pope at Angelus: Christmas invites us to offer help and joy

At the Sunday Angelus on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, Pope Francis recalls how Mary "arose and went with haste" to visit and assist her relative Elizabeth. In a similar way, he says we can reach out in generosity towards others and bring the joy of Jesus, as Mary did with Elizabeth. towards others and bring the joy of Jesus, as Mary did with Elizabeth. Pope Francis greeted pilgrims in Saint Peter's Square on this Fourth Sunday of Advent and encouraged them to "arise and to go in haste towards Christmas." He was referring to the day's Gospel reading which recounts when Mary went to visit Elizabeth, who was also pregnant, as a response to an inner impulse calling her to be close and help her. He said in this way Mary gave Elizabeth "the joy of Jesus, the joy she carried in her heart and in her womb", proclaimed in her Magnificat.

Arise and go in haste - The Pope then reflected on two dimensions of this calling: "to arise" and "to go in haste". The verb "to arise" reflects how Mary took the initiative to move forward and not get bogged down with worries surrounding her unexpected pregnancy that risked exposing her to misunderstanding or even punishment, or also the difficulties ahead on how to manage and fully comprehend this incredible experience. These challenges did not overcome or paralyze her, the Pope observed, and she put her trust in God and boldly went to reach out to her relative Elizabeth to accompany and help her who was advanced in years and with child.

Reach out to others - The Pope said we too should try to step out of our own sphere of challenges, problems, negative thoughts, and reach out to others to be of help, just as Mary did. We could visit with an elderly person, the lonely, call someone, or offer any other act of charity. He noted, God is great and always there to help us if "we reach out to Him". Living and expressing joy - The second phrase, "to go in haste", the Pope said means living our daily lives with joy, "looking ahead with confidence," despite the temptation to do otherwise or be immobile. Mary proceeded with a "step" of one whose "whose heart and life are full of God, full of his joy", the Pope noted, and so also should we ask ourselves how our own "step" is, and whether we move forward with hope, energy and perserverance. If we get dragged down by melancholy, he pointed out, we will not bring God to anyone. The Pope encouraged everyone to be positive, despite our daily difficulties, and even cultivate a healthy sense of humour, adding that the first act of charity we can do is to offer "a serene and smiling face", to bring the "joy of Jesus, as Mary did with Elizabeth."

In conclusion, he prayed that the Blessed Mother may help us "to arise and to go in haste towards Christmas!"

The LORD has proclaimed to the ends of the earth: Say to daughter Zion, "See, your savior comes! See, his reward is with him, his recompense before him." They shall be called "The Holy People," "The Redeemed of the LORD." And you shall be called "Cared For," "A City Not Forsaken" (Is 62:11-12).

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

To all Lithuanians and those of Lithuanian descent scattered around the world I greet you with a Holy Christmas!

At Mass on Christmas Day morning we hear the hopeful words of the prophet Isaiah, after the fulfilled prophecy of the birth of the Savior in Bethlehem, "See, your Savior comes!" We also read about the Lord's redeemed people as well as about His "City not forsaken." These words remind us that God never forgets us and His mercy is eternal. However, we must never forget God. That link between us and Him needs to be fostered daily.

That bond is especially important now, during the pandemic as new variants spread and leave painful footprints of their passage. To unite communities whose members have been scattered or separated from one another is a difficult challenge for the Church, which has always proclaimed unity and reconciliation through Jesus Christ.

The celebration of the birth of Christ brings an opportunity to return to the church and find spiritual shelter for those who have distanced themselves. During the Christmas season we are all invited to worship the Lord as a family and to celebrate our unique Lithuanian traditions.

Just as we decorate and light our homes for Christmas with our shiniest of ornaments, so too we are called to reveal to others the best parts of ourselves. Let us bear witness to the miracle of the birth of Jesus so that it is not just in the moment but stays with us throughout the year. Now is not the time to close ourselves off to others or to set boundaries; with the help of the Light of Jesus let us live in unity.

Blessings of the Newborn Lord descend upon you. Your Franciscan Fathers and all the ordained Clergy serving our Parish extend Christmas greetings to all our parishioners on the occasion of Christ's birth.
